- FIG Working Week 2019 Rudolf Staiger (Plenary Session)
 - Targets for 2030 are ambitious
 - Not enough time / money for a classical cadastre
 - Faster solutions needed to adapt to specific needs
 - ! Warning ! Not a ready-to-use-solution
 - Needed: best practice examples and textbooks
- Role FIG + FIG Commission 7
 - Offer platform for stakeholders
 - Be a link between stakeholders

Time +++ costs +++ maintenance +++ updates +++

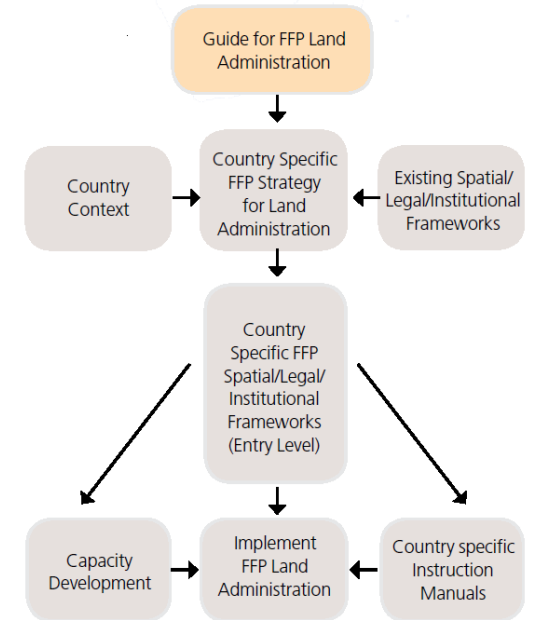

Identified red threads

- Importance of political will to be successful
- Confirmation that it works, many pilots have proven the approach
- Participatory approach increases quality and reduces conflicts
- Legal framework is tough, but when it is arranged it is a catalyst to scale up
- Multi-sectoral approach boosts the process
- Transition from completing data collection to (magnitude of) maintenance requires attention
- Lack of structural funding for scaling up efforts
- The next generation will make the change
